A Legacy of Partneship Creates Community Connection

Northbrook Civic Foundation's support of the library spans decades. In January, we celebrated with a ribbon-cutting ceremony.

Thanks to a generous \$25,000 grant from the Northbrook Civic Foundation, we were able to add new audiovisual equipment to the library's Civic Room, making it easier than ever to host hybrid meetings that seamlessly connect both in-person and remote participants.

A high-tech upgrade for community engagement

The new setup includes:

- Four ceiling speakers for balanced audio throughout the room
- Two cameras on either side of the room for full video coverage
- **Sound-damping audio** to improve audio quality for all attendees

These enhancements allow virtual participants who join via Zoom or other platforms to enjoy a smoother, more immersive experience.

The Civic room also features an advanced listening system, compatible with loop devices, to ensure greater accessibility for individuals with hearing impairments.

Improved community connection and accessibility

This new technology will help expand engagement, increase participation in library programs, and foster a stronger sense of community involvement.



Kelly Durov, the library's Assistant Director, states, "The community expressed a strong interest in more events that were accessible for remote participants, and we're excited to offer a space that allows people to engage with our programs based on their preference."

Like the library's other meeting rooms, the Civic Room will be used for library programs and can also be reserved by Northbrook Library cardholders 18 years or older.

Celebrating our Partnership

In early 2025, we invited members of the Northbrook Civic Foundation to a ribbon-cutting ceremony to celebrate the generous grant. During the event, Civic President
Dan Westel emphasized the purpose
of the donation, stating "We hope the
community gets great use out of it. This
is why we produce Northbrook Days—
to be able to help the community in
this way."

We thank the Northbrook Civic Foundation for helping to strengthen community access and engagement.



A History of Partnership: Northbrook Library and the Northbrook Civic Foundation

The partnership between the Northbrook Public Library and the Northbrook Civic Foundation dates back more than 70 years. In 1951, Bertram Pollak, president of the Northbrook Civic Association, championed the effort to establish a public library, which led to a successful referendum, which passed by just six votes.

In 1953, the Civic Foundation dedicated funds from 16 years of Northbrook Days to construct the town's first library at the corner of Shermer and Church Streets.

As Northbrook grew, the Civic Foundation supported the library's growing collection by helping to fund the construction of a larger building at Cherry Lane and Cedar Avenue in 1969.

Today, thanks to the continued generosity of the Northbrook Civic Foundation and the community, the library continues to evolve, offering innovative resources and inclusive spaces that serve the needs of its residents.

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



Building Community: A Northbrook Book Club Celebrates 45 Years

In 1979, about the time the Happy Meal at McDonald's went national and Disco Demolition Night at Comiskey Park went up in smoke, a group of Northbrook neighbors on Oak Avenue launched a literary tradition built on a block of friendship.

Through 45 years and 425 books, divorces and marriages, kids and grandkids, moves and deaths, the Book Club met monthly except to accommodate vacations or holidays.

How it all began

"Jack Spangenberger asked a few neighbors if they would ever think about joining a book club," explained Dan Cacchione, "and a couple of us suckers said, yeah, okay."

The club provided a regular date of two or three hours to discuss the book the first half ... then kibitz.

"It was really the story of friendship," Dan said, "and how that grows over time as it relates to having something in common, such as reading the same book."

After a couple of name changes, the group affectionately became known as the "The Oak Steet Book Club."

Yes, it was Oak Avenue. And, yes, "Street" was misspelled, but the typo appeared years ago and the inside joke stuck.

The club began with *The Adventures* of *Huckleberry Finn*. For the Oak folks, Northbrook Public Library provided a go-to resource. For Dan Cacchione, whose home remains less than a mile away, that never changed.

"If it was my turn to pick a book, I could go to the library and search through the book club selections," he said. "Someone in the Fiction & Media department would walk with me to the selections if I wanted help."

When Ruthie married Dan, she joined a family with three daughters and an extended family in the book club. She was struck by all the weddings of neighborhood kids raised by this village of friends.

"Unfortunately for her, she walks in here as a newbie, and we've had this book club thing for 20-some years," Dan said, "but she blended right in."

These were neighbors who cared for each other, with families who grew and grew up together, helping with anything from babysitting to renovating.

Over the years, rules were adopted, hosts and selectors rotated, and bylaws evolved. Hardcover books, eBooks, and audiobooks were okay. Meetings evolved, too. Dinner was served instead of just appetizers.

Ruth and Dan hosted an annual holiday party with 45-50 guests until the pandemic.

"I would invite all the people that are in the book club as well as their kids and their kids' kids," Ruth said. "I looked around and the commonality was pretty much the book club."

During the pandemic, the club moved to Zoom – and once to Dan's backyard, where his wife placed warm blankets on the socially distanced chairs.

A November to remember

When the group dwindled to six, half living in distant suburbs, Dan knew it was time to stop. He hosted the book club's final meeting last November. Five former members came, too, and souvenir mugs and a cake commemorated the event. Booklets were distributed chronicling the logs and journey of the Oak Steet Book Club.

Although the book club has come to an end, the group wants to meet for dinner every month or two.

"It was a little bit of sadness to see it has passed on," Dan said, "but a lot of fun and laughable memories."


