Notes from the Executive Director

You might have noticed that the newsletter felt a little heavier. Prices are on the rise and we want to be good stewards of the taxpayer's dollars. Instead of accepting a 33% increase in printing costs, we chose to switch to a quarterly newsletter

format which saves money and trees. With this change, we are saving about 4 trees per year resulting in a reduction of 400 pounds of CO2 being released.

What does this change mean for you? Nothing really except that you'll get information on some of our programs and events earlier. Including finding out in this newsletter about our October One Book One Northbrook community wide read, *Clark & Division* by Naomi Hirahara, which weaves a poignant tale of a Japanese family during World War II and what they experience first in a Japanese internment camp and then here in Chicago.

I hope you'll join in our community-wide read. Reading can often be a solitary activity and reading the same book is a great way to connect with friends, family, neighbors, and strangers!

I can't wait to connect with you and hear what you think about *Clark & Division*.
