When she's not rescuing abandoned ducks, a rooster left in a box, or a deer that had burst through a home window, Northbrook's Animal Control Officer Gina Manski has an escape of her own. Books. She devours them.

One day, she plans to write a book herself titled *A Year in the Life of a Bibliophile*. And if she could see her book in her beloved Northbrook Public Library?

"Oh, I would love it. I would probably sit and look at it all day long," Gina says with a laugh.

For now, her library card lets her chase down an array of print books, eBooks, and audiobooks as passionately as she pursues a wayward animal. She keeps Hoopla and Libby open on her phone and says, "Trust me, if it's available, I know about it. And I will use it and take advantage of it."

In addition to books, she and her family have enjoyed the library's programs, Collaboratory, games, and more.

"People don't realize how much the library has to offer," Gina says. "A library can also bring people together to learn and grow. You can't put a price on libraries because the opposite is ignorance, and where is that going to get us?"

The healing power of books

Gina prefers reading a book before listening to it but is a huge fan of audiobooks. They free her hands, rest her eyes, and offer voices that enhance the experience—and, in one case, changed her life.



While undergoing treatment for salivary-gland cancer a few years ago, Gina listened to her favorite narrator, British actor Steve West, read *The Little Paris Bookshop*. His voice on that book touched her.

"I actually wrote Steve West a letter and told him how much it helped me," says Gina, who was 14 months cancer-free at the time. "He responded, and I have this voicemail." Gina clicks play.

"Thank you for that lovely message," West said during a long and heartfelt response. "I feel like I got as much out of this as I hope you do from hearing from me."

The cancer has not returned, and *The Little Paris Bookshop* by Nina George remains her favorite book.

"So, when they say books can change your life, this quasi-changed my life," Gina says, "because it helped me get through that horrible time."

The stories of a lifetime

Books have shaped Gina's life since she was a child growing up in Chicago.

"The only library I had access to when I was young was the school library, and you couldn't access it until you were in third grade," she says.

So she improvised by binging on encyclopedias at home. Her favorite? The letter "D" (for dog, of course).

Gina was always rescuing stray animals and looking for books. When she was old enough, she would walk two miles each way to the local public library. In eighth grade, she wrote in her memory box that she wanted to be a veterinarian and a private investigator.

On Gina's first night with her driver's license, she and a friend interrupted a food run to check a cardboard box by the tracks for strays. Inside, they found a cat with her kittens. Now what?



Someone suggested the Anti-Cruelty Society downtown. Gina had never driven on a highway, but they loaded up the box and off they went.

"That was our first "something in a cardboard box" rescue," she says. "It's sort of apropos, isn't it?"

Gina has spent the last 20 years working for the Northbrook Police Department, often rescuing animals. This is why she says her second book would be titled Something in a Cardboard Box.

"And that," she jokes, "is the story of my life."


